Wollongong has had a rather warm and dry winter with less gusty westerly winds than usual and spring in September was colder, until we left for two weeks on October 5th to go to Tasmania. In our absence the weather reached two extremes - 79mm of heavy rain on October 7th and 35°C on October 11th!

On our return the garden had changed completely to a very lush spring display, with extraordinary growth all round (including the lawns) and a host of flowers. The Vireyas did not lag behind and we had the biggest truss ever on a R.leucogigas x R.aurigeranum hybrid - nine flowers about 100mm diam. on a truss some 220 mm wide. For contrast the smallest flower - barely 18mm in diam. - appeared for the first time on a very sickly plant labelled R.macgregoriae - yellow form. It was yellow and it had six petals and a very tightly bunched cluster of 14 stamens, so I would not care to guess at its parentage.

Some of my Vireyas date from the very early days and were unnamed seedlings. Although the parentage of the hybrids was known, labels can be misplaced and some of them were no doubt siblings of future registered hybrids.

The attached lists of Australian registered hybrids is included at the request of Graeme Eaton, it includes Azaleas, Rhododendrons and Vireyas. Your assistance in this survey would be much appreciated and could lead to some interesting conclusions.

TASMANIA

Our visit to Tasmania was to attend the Annual General Meeting of the Australian Rhododendron Society in Hobart. The availability of births on 'The Spirit of Tasmania' and car space gave us a few spare days to see gardens in Burnie and Hobart that were not part of the A.G.M.

In Burnie we were able to again visit the long established garden of Bob Malone at Lapoinya. It is still a privilege to see this magnificent collection of rhododendrons, particularly the broad leaved hybrids growing on the incredibly steep banks of the creek.

Also we had several visits to the Emu Valley Rhododendron Garden of the N.W.Branch of the A.R.S. - We first saw this in 1981 when we witnessed the first planting of a rhododendron by the Society President, at that time Dr.Chris Laurie. Much planning then went on, the garden is situated in a steep gully in a virgin forest, the soil has been mulched for years with the fallen leaves and there are several springs to fill their dams. Much clearing had to be done but provision was also made for shelter belts.

This area gets occasional frosts and some damage was evident on a few petals, so their Vireya planting was made under the shelter of some tall Blackwoods. At a guess there were at least a hundred plants here, in the ground or nesting on the native soft tree ferns. Many of these were in flower and they do flower all the year around.

The rhododendrons are planted in two areas - the most central area with hybrids. and around this geographical groups of plants, e.g. natives of U.S.A., Japan, Burma etc. where companion planting of other species from those areas will complement the scene and provide shelter. Weeds have been a problem but weedkillers have been used and the garden looked very clean. Possums have been an nuisance - as they seem to be elsewhere in Tasmania from the number of powerpoles etc. that have sheet metal guards around them - but an electric fence has reduced the damage from all pests.

The Garden now has a very new Visitors Centre - with refreshments - and is open each day for the main flowering season. However some extensive hybridizing has resulted in some plants that will flower in August and others that flower in February.

In Hobart we saw a number of private gardens with magnificent displays of rhododendrons, but their frost problems do limit the Vireyas. We were fortunate to see a very fine specimen of Wattle Bird in full flower in Barry Davidson's front garden.

One oddity was the number of bumble bees. Here one will occasionally pay us a brief visit, but they are so numerous around Hobart that they are not welcome, being blamed for most of the pollination of rhododendron flowers, which increases the need for deadheading.

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From Neil Puddey, 'Jagera' Woolgoolga, N.S.W.

"I have continued with yet more Vireya planting in preparation for our opening in September with the Australian Open Garden Scheme. I have found, as I guess most Vireya growers have, that they perform much better when planted out.

My planting technique has been simply to place the plants on the soil and build up around them with composted pine bark. This approach has been successful for our sub-tropical conditions so far, but time will tell. I chose to plant many of my stock plants into the garden not only for aesthetics but also because I was frustrated with the tip burn that many of my plants were showing.

This problem is not evident in the garden plants, suggesting that Vireyas are not totally happy in pots. I also believe that this is a symptom of root problems and that the plant is under stress as a result. Invariably in potted plants after a great show of flower, I would see leaf browning and upon root investigation would find problems. A pot bound Vireya has little buffering from water/nutrient floods and famines, combinations of which probably led to root damage and invasion by phytophthora.

In the last issue you also mention the semi-double flowers of 'Rosie Posie'. This hybrid came from Graham and Wendy Snell's collection. Some blooms are standard but others are very petaloid. I see the same petaloid nature in 'Ivory Coast', 'Jean Baptiste' and 'Red Rooster'. My one attempt at a cross between two of these looked good for five weeks but then failed. The stamens are generally too disfigured to produce pollen and in 'Rosie Posie's case I think it is female sterile. I have noticed some petaloid tendency in other hybrids but these have been single flowers and not repeated. Other interesting flowers are those produced with 9 and even 12 petals but not as a result of mutated stamens.

Our planting at the Coff's Harbour Regional Botanic Gardens was looking very nice until some rather desperate person helped themselves. A nice plant of R.notiale disappeared with these so maybe they knew what they were doing. Not to be defeated we have replanted, I am just hoping that I don't end up supplying half of Coff's Harbour.

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A letter from Rodney Wadham, Lenswood, S.A. is relevant to previous comments:- "I apologise for not writing before but have been waiting for some good news to relate from the Vireya scene over here, unfortunately in vain. The lack of interest at all levels is depressing as I believe that Vireyas can be grown well in Adelaide, mostly in pots and hanging baskets, provided some protection is given against climatic extremes, which, in the suburbs, occur in hot summers and, in the hills, cold winters. There is nowhere for the public to see good quality plants with a sufficient number in flower at any one time.

My own plants have survived another winter under tall gums with

Petal Blight

This winter an outbreak of Petal Blight here and elsewhere was the most severe that we have had, affecting not only Azaleas but also Vireyas and Rhododendrons. Normally this is not seen in winter when cold days prevent its development. Dr. Peter Valder has done considerable research on the subject of petal blight and this has been published in the March 1974 issue of 'The Rhododendron', journal of the A.R.S., Vol 13 No.1.

He quotes one comment from U.S. research which said:- "It has been shown in the United States that temperatures of about 18 -19°C (Weiss and Smith, 1941) are the most favourable for infection and the enlargement of the lesions. Thus it becomes troublesome in the spring as soon as the weather becomes warm enough."

The spores of the fungus which find their way onto the petals cannot germinate unless free moisture is present, and this can come from dew if it remains for long enough. So our warmer and more humid winter with less drying westerly winds gave us a winter instead of a spring infestation. Usually petal blight has been prevalent in the mid range of temperatures and not seen in winter nor in the heat of summer here.

Regular spraying with Benlate was used in early trials and found to be only partially effective although it did greatly reduce the formation of the over wintering of the sclerotia and the consequent reduction in the next year's attack. Bayleton was then found to be much more effective and still is, provided it is applied before the flower buds are open. 'Mancozeb plus' is also effective as an occasional change from Bayleton in case local resistance to it should develop. It is important to remove all affected flowers from the bush and the ground before sclerotia can develop.

Much more detail may be found in Dr. Valder's article.

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In Retrospect

The rhododendron registrations that were summarised in the last issue roused my interest in the introduction and history of *Vireya* hybrids in Australia. Looking through the Royal Horticultural Society's yearly list of rhododendron registrations brought to light some interesting facts that will be tabled in the next issue. In addition there have been numerous articles on *Vireyas* in the A.R.S. journals, the first one, very appropriately, was in Vol.1, No.1, Feb.1959 viz."Rhododendron *Lochae*" that was illustrated by a drawing of a truss by R.Cutten, which is reproduced on the first page of this issue. The article read:-

"Rhododendron *lochae* is the only member of the genus *Rhododendron* indigenous to Australia, and therefore it should be of special interest to Australian gardeners. It is a native of North Queensland where it is found growing both as an epiphyte*, in a restricted area around Bellenden Ker, near the beginning of the Great Dividing Range between Innisfail and Cairns. It is an attractive shrub with glossy dark green elliptical leaves and geranium red bell shaped flowers.

Although *R.lochae* is still little known to Australian gardeners it occupies an important place among *Rhododendrons* in Great Britain, where it recently received an Award of Merit from the Royal Horticultural Society. It is pleasing also to note that the Ferny Creek Horticultural Society last year adopted it as the emblem of that Society.

Owing to its semi-epiphyte character *R.lochae* is very suitable for growing in a container, indeed it will actually thrive better in a well drained pot, tub or tin than it will planted in the ground, even with good shelter. A good potting compost is necessary. The writer finds a mixture of leafmould, peat moss and fern fibre very satisfactory. As it comes from the tropical rain forests, protection from frost and strong sunlight is absolutely essential.

(* A plant that lives on, but does not derive nourishment from another plant.)

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The accompanying illustration makes it quite clear that this was not *R.notiale*.

In May 1961 Mr.V.J.Boulter wrote that *R.Lochae* did not do well in the cold at Mt. Dandenong but did well at Ringwood and concluded :-" I trust that this article will encourage some one in one of our really hot districts to try *R.lochae*."

In response Mr.L.C.Weber,Epping N.S.W. wrote:" Does Sydney come within this zone ?. Two very small rooted cuttings were obtained in 1956. One was potted in a loam-peat mixture, the other in a loam-sand-peat mixture. Both thrived, the former making better growth, but the latter flowered first. The buds opened in succession giving a prolonged flowering period from early March to the end of April. Both were grown under bush-house conditions with no special treatment.....

AUSTRALIAN REGISTERED HYBRIDS

In this newsletter there is a complete list of Australian registered hybrids. As registrar, what I am trying to find out is :-

1. How many of them are still alive.
2. Where they are so that a/ We can get a slide of each to complete the slide collection of Australian registered hybrids
b/ We can ensure that there is more than one plant of each hybrid to try to ensure survival.
3. Get a greater understanding of the hardiness of each plant by finding how widely it is growing.

If each person who receives this list could circle (or use a highlighter) to mark each of the registered hybrids they are growing, complete the name, address and phone number section at the bottom, and return it to me, I will be able to collate the returns to obtain the information I am seeking. If you feel like adding a short note with further details of each plant (e.g. height, width, hardiness, your opinion of the plant, etc.) that will be appreciated and will add to our knowledge of each hybrid, but if that is too much work and is likely to deter you from returning your marked list, don't worry about those details, but forward on your completed list. Another idea that could help us assess the hardiness of each hybrid would be to place a cross beside hybrids which you have tried and which have died.

I accept that many people may believe that some of our earlier hybrids have been surpassed in quality by some of the newer hybrids, however it is important to preserve plants of all named hybrids 1. To use as comparisons when people are trying to identify plants in older gardens.

2. To preserve the gene pool. You never know when some hybridist will see qualities needed as a parent.

3. Some of the early hardy hybrids may grow in areas of Australia where previously rhododendrons have not been tried.

I may need to follow up this survey later with a list of hybrids about which I have received no information. I'll have to wait and see.
